2. Main features

Course objectives
The aim of the course on electoral systems is for students to become familiar with the main types and functioning of electoral systems, and to review the interactions between electoral systems and the political system. Students will gain deeper knowledge about the formation, functioning, and political consequences of the Hungarian electoral system. The goal of the voter behavior course section is to provide students with insight into the theory and practice of voter behavior. During the classes, we will review previous research on voter motivations and familiarize ourselves with the current domestic and international empirical trends regarding the background of party choice.
Brief description of the course
Students will learn about the core literature, ideas, and theoretical frameworks of the subject through relevant lectures and seminars as well as independent study. Case studies and examples are presented to aid in the learning process. An important part of the course's structure is devoted to comprehending and assessing Hungarian systems. Smaller seminars and online exercises help students become familiar with and practice the necessary mathematical formulas.
